September has been full of the Open Book festival which seems to have exhilarated and exhausted audiences, organisers and participating writers. It was wonderful to see the range of engagements with the issues that are as pressing in South Africa as they are in the rest of the world. Discussions around identity, place, belonging and the power of literature to shape how we understand the world and live in it.

There was similar excitement at the Edinburgh Festival in August which brought together writers from across the world. A world that is currently in enormous and tragic flux as people flee the intolerable violence that has been unleashed by the wars in Syria, Afghanistan and the Horn of Africa. Europe is closing its borders and there is fear and xenophobia - something that has blighted South Africa's response to refugees and

migrants.

Writers - like everyone - struggle to bear witness to these things. However it is in the exchange of views, the voices of writers from parts of the world different to ours, the testimony of those who have suffered that enable us to understand and to find ways to heal the ruptures through language and through writing.
