Why Should We Vote For You? Campaign

1st April 2014

Arterial Network of South Africa, in association with diverse arts, culture and heritage organisations, today launched a major South African advocacy campaign to position the broad sector, across disciplines, as an important election issue in our country.

The campaign centres on a letter to all political parties in South Africa, asking them why people working in the arts, culture and heritage sector in South Africa should vote for them.

The organisations call on political parties to engage in a national conversation about the role of the creative sector in our country. It is also asking arts, culture and heritage organisations and individuals endorse the project and calls on artists, designers, writers. performers, musicians, heritage workers. filmmakers and all practitioners and producers working in these and related fields to create work inspired by the question: Why should we vote for you?

Speaking on behalf of the campaign, the Secretary General of Arterial Network South Africa, Valmont Layne, says, "We believe cultural life and artistic creativity is a human right and not a luxury, and that all South Africans have this right. We hear a lot of lip-service to the need for social cohesion, imagination and homegrown innovation and we agree that our sector is best placed to inspire and contribute to that need. Yet the arts and our cultural lives are often marginalised. This is obvious in budget allocations, consultation processes and a general lack of respect for our contribution and, more significantly, our potential contribution."

Layne continues: "We are confident that through the work of creative practitioners, including writers, journalists, curators, painters, performers, sculptors, dancers, poets, musicians, filmmakers, designers and artists working in experimental forms, we are influential. We aim to manifest that influence through this campaign and put the spotlight on our sectors plight – and its power."

In addition to requesting that political parties respond to the question *Why should we vote for you?* the letter addressed to them includes a number of related questions including:

- 1. Does your party think arts, culture and heritage is a priority for South Africa?
- 2. Does your party support our sector in South Africa and in which ways?
- 3. What are your policies for arts, culture and heritage?
- 4. What would you change about current arts, culture and heritage policy in South Africa?
- 5. Is your party aware of the current proposed revision to South Africa's White Paper on Arts Culture and Heritage, the process of submissions to it and its current status?
- 6. What does your party think about the National Development Plan in terms of the arts, culture and heritage environment?
- 7. Is your party aware of current public funding budgets and priorities for our sector in South Africa in terms of published plans and realities?
- 8. Does your party use our sector to market itself either during the election build-up or before / after that?

- 9. How do you think creativity can contribute to community development, poverty alleviation and job creation in South Africa?
- 10. What is your policy on arts, culture and heritage education for children and adults?

As part of the campaign, practitioners and leaders in the sector will participate in debates and activities during the election build-up and the campaign will post news, responses and related information via social media.





Caine Prize shortlist announced

Congratulations to Diane Awerbuck on being shortlisted for this year's Caine Prize for her story entitled "Phosphorescence" in *Cabin Fever*. The winner of the £10,000 prize will be announced at a celebratory dinner at the Bodleian Library, Oxford, on Monday, 14th July. To commemorate this being the fifteen year of the Caine Prize each shortlisted writer will also be awarded £500.

The winner of the Caine Prize will be given the opportunity of taking up a month's residence at Georgetown University, as a Writer-in-Residence at the Lannan Center for Poetics and Social Practice. The winner will also be invited to take part in the Open Book Festival in Cape Town in September 2014, the Storymoja Hay Festival in Nairobi and the Ake Festival in Nigeria.

New Fringe Festival for Cape Town

Press Release – 15th April 2014

The National Arts Festival and the City of Cape Town today announced a partnership which will see the launch of a new performing arts festival in September, modelled on some of the world's iconic events.

The new Cape Town Fringe is inspired by the energy and ethos of popular Fringe Festivals in New York, Amsterdam, Adelaide and Edinburgh, and will feature "young, dynamic and cutting edge" work from some of the country's leading theatremakers, according to Festival CEO Tony Lankester.

The Cape Town Fringe aims to present around 40 productions in venues in and around the city centre, as well as in satellite venues in areas such as Langa. "Access is critical to the success of a Fringe and was a big factor in our decision to proceed with this project," Executive Deputy Mayor, Ian Neilson, acting Mayoral Committee Member for Tourism, Events and Marketing said. "Ticket pricing, choice of venues as well as the scheduling of performances all contribute to making a Fringe Festival appeal to as many people as possible, both traditional and non-traditional theatergoing audiences," Neilson continued.

A public call for proposals was made at the launch of the event, with the Festival's Artistic Director, Ismail Mahomed, saying that organisers were looking for work that is "brash, bold, cheeky, outspoken, confident, socially aware and independent".

The Cape Town Fringe will run from 25th September until 5th October 2014. The call for proposals is currently open and more information can be found at www.capetownfringe.co.za


'There's no escaping this one,' he says, but not to me. He says it to the ground and the sky and the thin arms of the waiting trees, but not to me. A film-maker by profession, Catherine has the perfect family: a supportive husband and a bright ten-year-old daughter. But Catherine's beloved father is deteriorating. As he slips away into dementia, so too does a guilty truth they share: they both know what happened to Devin, Catherine's sister, a shadow in a beautiful skin. Catherine's adult success has come at a price. Now she has to come to terms with the silences in her past. Sister Moon is a story of love and growing

up, of exclusion and abuse. Moving, and emotionally charged, Kirsten Miller's second novel renders the insidious consequences of family secrets.

Devil's Harvest by Andrew Brown

After a secret drone strike on a civilian target in South Sudan, RAF air marshal George Bartholomew discovers that a piece of shrapnel traceable back to a British Reaper has been left behind at the scene. He will do anything to get it back, but he is not the only one.

Dissatisfied with his life and ousted from the marital bed, Associate Professor Gabriel Cockburn, an ambitious botanist at Bristol University, sets out to South Sudan in pursuit of a rare plant that is crucial to his research. Once there, he finds




himself caught up in the travails of a young Sudanese woman, Alek, who agrees to guide him through dangerous territory to find the plant. But Alek has an agenda of her own.

As events move beyond their control, the lives of these characters are thrown together, with explosive results.

A political thriller that spans the globe, from the halls of Bristol University and London's secretive MI6 building to the dusty streets of Juba and the refugee camps in war-torn South Sudan, *Devil's Harvest* exposes the dark truths of the international

arms trade and the plight of the world's newest country.

Johannesburg is becalmed. A wave of New Age belief and an apparent cure for crime have radically altered South Africa's political landscape.

Jay Rowan has been hired to black out the windows of random vacant rooms. He's trying to keep out of trouble, but he's a pawn in political aide Kenneth Lang's project Dark Windows. A mystical charlatan has convinced Lang's boss

that she can affect the ultimate transformation with a supernatural visitation, the

Arrival, and Lang needs to prepare for its coming. When Jay and his married girlfriend Beth realise that someone has died in every room, political and personal tensions come to a head and Jay, Beth and Lang must confront the past they've been trying to avoid.

Dark Windows is a moody, intelligent literary thriller.

Sunderland by Ken Barris & Michael Cope



Unhappily married Cape Town academic Art Berger is offered what appears to be a professional lifeline: to reconstitute the final papers of the great South African writer Charles de Villiers into the novel he was writing at the time of his death. He is uncomfortable about the role of ghostwriter, but the project becomes literary detective-work he cannot give up.

Introduce De Villiers's beautiful daughter Taryn, and Art is ensnared. *Sunderland* alternates between sections, mostly in journal form, chronicling Art's struggle to make sense of De Villiers's fragmented and disordered text, and sections scenes, notes, outlines from that very work (also entitled

'Sunderland'). This novel of ideas and of character is a fascinating collaboration by two of South Africa's finest and most lauded wranglers of words.
