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

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Book Launch: *An Imperfect Blessing* by Nadia Davids, Tuesday, 20th May 2014, 5.30 for 6.00 p.m., Book Lounge, Cape Town

It is 1993. South Africa is on the brink of total transformation and in Walmer Estate, a busy suburb on the slopes of Devil's Peak, fourteen-year-old Alia Dawood is about to undergo a transformation of her own. She watches with fascination and fear as the national drama unfolds, longing to be a part of what she knows to be history in the making. As her revolutionary aspirations strengthen in the months before the elections, her intense, radical Uncle Waleed reappears, forcing her parents and sister Nasreen to confront his subversive and dangerous past.

Nadia Davids' first novel moves across generations and communities, through the suburbs to the city centre, from the lush gardens of private schools to the dingy bars of Observatory, from landmark mosques and churches to the manic procession of the Cape Carnival, through evictions, rebellions, political assassinations and first loves. The book places one family's story at the heart of a country's rebirth and interrogates issues of faith, race, belonging and freedom.

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Journalists and bloggers around the world continue to face reprisals and restrictions on 22nd World Press Freedom Day

PEN International Press Release: 1st May 2014

On 3 May PEN International marks World Press Freedom Day – affirming the importance of freedom of expression and press freedom – a fundamental human right enshrined in Article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

“PEN members worldwide are personally engaged in the struggle for freedom of the press,” said Marian Botsford Fraser, Chair of PEN International’s Writers in Prison Committee. *“We are no strangers to the challenges and dangers journalists and media workers face in the course of their work, which is essential in providing checks and balances to all governments.”*

The day is also an opportunity for the international community to renew their commitment to press freedom.

The date marks the anniversary of the Declaration of Windhoek, a statement of principles drawn up by African journalists in 1991 calling for a free, independent and pluralistic media on that continent and throughout the world.

PEN International monitors attacks on hundreds of journalists worldwide each year, highlighting the dangers they face. The organisation campaigns for dozens of emblematic cases of journalists persecuted by governments in all regions of the world. PEN also campaigns on behalf of transitional media and internet users, recognising that writers – including online journalists, bloggers and social media producers – in the digital world, where news is increasingly produced and consumed, are no less subject to forms of persecution such as arbitrary arrest, torture, unfair trials, physical attacks (including in the most extreme cases killing) and threats than their traditional media colleagues.

Digital media has vastly expanded the capability of individuals, groups and whole societies to express themselves both privately and publicly, to associate freely, to exchange literature, ideas and information. Whilst digital media has expanded the ability of individuals to share in such a way, it has also increased the number of individuals who are vulnerable to persecution for their writing.

Online writers additionally face new forms of attack such as cyber-attacks, data breaches, invasion of privacy and undue surveillance. Through its Declaration on Digital Freedom, PEN has been campaigning to protect journalists online and highlight the ways in which assaults, such as online censorship and illegal surveillance, limit the right to freedom of expression – which includes the right to receive and impart information – and undermine press freedom.

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Shot at Cannes

Press Release: 26/04/2014

A film produced and written by Durban filmmaker and AFDA Durban Scriptwriting Lecturer, (*Ed. – and SA PEN member*) Janet van Eeden, *A Shot at the Big Time*, the short, has been selected for the Cannes Court Mètrage, the short film corner of the official Cannes Festival 2014. It was chosen over many, many entries.

“This honour is something my co-producer, Magda M. Olchawska, and I have dreamed of since we joined forces to make *A Shot at the Big Time*, the short,” says Van Eeden. “We met online when I ran the Indiegogo.com crowd-funding campaign in 2011. I’d given up on the dream recently and am working hard at present raising funds to make the feature film by the end of the year, so when Magda let me know late on Thursday night that we’d been accepted I was over the moon.”

Van Eeden launched the crowd-funding campaign for *Shot* on 11th of the 11th 2011, on Remembrance Day, in remembrance of her brother, Jimmy, who was killed on the border in mysterious circumstances after being there for only three days in 1979.

“I’d never been able to forget Jimmy’s tragic life, and after being challenged by film and theatre critic, Robert Greig, to write about my own life instead of writing plays about literary greats, I finally had the courage to put pen to paper and tackle one of the saddest experiences of my life,” she explains.

“Jimmy was my idol in the small town of Odendaalsrus. He was a rock star in the eyes of all the youngsters as he was the lead singer in a band which dreamed of making the big time. When he received his call-up papers when he was only seventeen, his dream was put on hold. Especially after he had a traumatic incident in basics which made him go AWOL, steal a rifle and fire rounds of bullets into the rubbish dump with the members of his band. A terrible accident happened and Jimmy had a breakdown and was classified as mentally unfit for military service. He tried to put his life back together again but he was broken by the events,” says Van Eeden. “Three years later the army forgot about the fact that they’d classified him as unfit and called him up to do Border duty. He was part of the infantry but he did not want to kill anyone. There are conflicting stories of what happened to him on the border on that fateful day, but all we know for sure is that three days after arriving on the border, my parents received a phone call telling them that Jimmy had been killed by a ricochet bullet.”

The feature film script of *A Shot at the Big Time* is based on the story of the tragic loss of Van Eeden’s brother which she says is Oedipal in its intensity. When she couldn’t get funding for the feature without giving away the rights to the film completely, and thereby compromising on the integrity of the story, she decided to do a crowd-funding campaign after listening to US expert Peter Broderick at the Durban Film Mart in 2011. She decided to produce the film herself. She didn’t raise enough money for the feature on Indiegogo.com but received so much support, including finding gifted young director from Australia, Stephen de Villiers, and London producer Magda M. Olchawska, that they decided to shoot the short film instead. The lead actors auditioned online as part of the crowd-funding campaign and “the best actors I could’ve dreamt of” were found in Brad Backhouse as Jimmy and Sean C. Michael as the antagonist Van Staden, as well as ex-Durbanite Tim Wells as Wiese. De Villiers flew out in July 2012 to film *Shot the Short*. Even an Executive Producer, Athol Williams, was found through the campaign and he gave whatever he could to make the short film happen.

A Shot at the Big Time was one of the projects selected for the Durban Film Mart in 2012 and the short film premiered at the Durban International Film Festival in July 2013. It was awarded an eThekweni Film Award in November 2013.

Van Eeden and Producer, Magda M. Olchawska will represent *A Shot at the Big Time* at Cannes.

Executive Producer, and fellow SA PEN member Athol Williams had this to say:

When I first heard about Janet's project to produce *A Shot at the Big Time* it struck me immediately as something that I wanted to be a part of because it so closely tracked what my poetry is about - how lies and deception can rob us of our humanity, and how truth, though unpleasant at times, can heal.

Apartheid and its associated wars created many deep wounds that still endure today. I believe that *A Shot at the Big Time* can have a profoundly healing role for those who still bear these wounds. There are many like Janet who lost loved ones on both sides of the conflicts, and many who participated in the atrocities. They will all respond differently to the movie, some will feel heard for the first time, others will find comfort or still others will have their eyes opened about what transpired on our borders. The movie generates anger among those who continue to worship at the altar of violence and oppression – we should show them tenderness but not yield to their anger.

I think the movie will also contribute to racial reconciliation in South Africa ... I wouldn't be surprised if many black South Africans think all white men enjoyed being in the army and thrived on the violence – if they didn't enjoy it then at least they were there because they believed in their cause. The movie shows that this wasn't the case.

I have exchanged countless emails with Janet over the last 2-3 years as we've worked on the movie. In one of them I wrote "you are the wildebeest who turns back to help a fellow wildebeest that has been cornered by lions." I greatly admire Janet's courage and vision in producing this movie – it hasn't been easy for her to deal with the constant reminder of the loss of her brother under such horrendous circumstances, and it hasn't been easy dealing with the many naysayers, but I believe the movie will be a blessing to those who watch it - the selection for Cannes is evidence of this. The entire cast and team has been incredible, producing something of beauty that they can all be proud of. I have been only too happy to be part of the cheerleading squad.

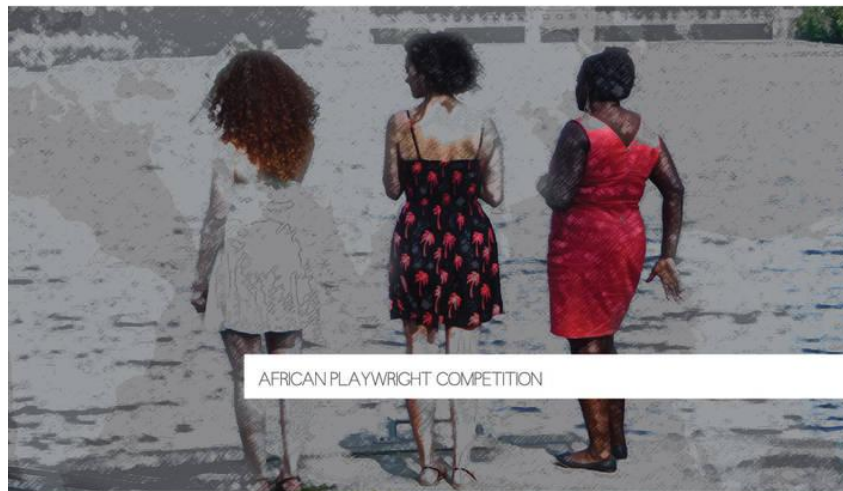

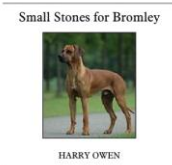

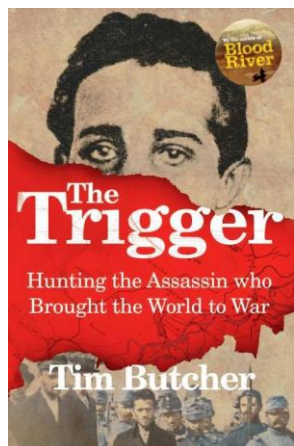

The Trigger – Hunting the Assassin Who Brought the World to War by Tim Butcher



On a summer morning in Sarajevo a hundred years ago, a teenage assassin named Gavrilo Princip fired not just the opening shots of the First World War but the starting gun for modern history, when he killed Archduke Franz Ferdinand. Yet the events Princip triggered were so monumental that his own story has been largely overlooked, his role garbled and motivations misrepresented.

The Trigger puts this right, filling out as never before a figure who changed our world and whose legacy still has an impact on all of us today. Born a penniless backwoodsman, Princip’s life changed when he trekked through Bosnia and Serbia to attend school. As he ventured across fault lines of faith, nationalism and empire, so tightly clustered in the Balkans, radicalisation slowly transformed him from a frail farm boy into history’s most influential assassin.
