

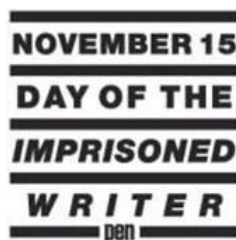

**Kalk Bay Books and SA PEN
invite you to an evening of rousing music, poetry and free speech
to commemorate the International Day of the Imprisoned Writer.**

Join master of ceremonies **Ann Donald** as she hosts an event that will include the voices of **Roger Lucey, Rhoda Kadalie, Ingrid de Kok, Jeremy Blackburn and Finuala Dowling.**

The aim of this event is to draw attention to the plight of all detained authors, but especially to the five specially selected cases of 2013:

Rodney Sieh (Liberia) - editor of the daily news website FrontPage Africa whose indefinite imprisonment was ordered after he was unable to pay US\$1.5 million in libel damages for a story about a former government minister

Kunchok Tsephel Gopey Tsang (Tibet) - arrested in February 2009 and serving a 15-year prison sentence after conviction of ‘disclosing state secrets’

Dina Meza (Honduras), of the Committee of Relatives of the Detained and Disappeared in Honduras, has received numerous text message and phone threats to her safety

Fazil Say (Turkey) - writer, composer and musician, convicted of “publicly denigrating the religious values of a section of the population” for various tweets and retweets, including lines of a poem attributed to Omar Khayyam

Rahnavard (Iran) - Academic and author, wife of Mir Hossein Mousavi, a candidate in the 2009 presidential election in Iran, held without charge or trial under unofficial house arrest along with her husband since February 2011, after he circulated a call on social media for demonstrations in support of the people of Egypt and Tunisia

2014 - 2015 International Writers Project Fellowship – call for applications – Deadline = 15th February 2014

The Brown Department of Literary Arts and Thomas J. Watson Institute for International Studies are seeking applications and nominations for the 2014 - 2015 International Writers Project Fellowship.

The fellowship provides institutional, intellectual, artistic and social support to writers who face personal danger, oppression, and/or threats to their livelihood in nations throughout the world. Each academic year, the fellowship is granted to one writer who is unable to practice free expression in his or her homeland. Deeply practical in nature and intention, the academic-year fellowship covers the costs of relocation and the writer’s living expenses in the U.S., and also provides an office on the campus of Brown University for ten months.

The IWP Fellowship is open to established creative writers (fiction writers, poets, or playwrights) who are persecuted in their home countries or who are actively prevented from pursuing free expression in their literary art. Writers interested in applying for the fellowship should send a case history, providing publishing history and explaining need, a writing sample (preferably in English), and a resume, to the International Writers Project, Department of Literary Arts, Box 1923, Brown University, Providence, RI 02912, or they may email materials to iwp@brown.edu The IWP **will accept applications until February 15, 2014**. No. 1: **Man** I was mowing the lawn of a Sunday and the blades of the lawnmower, which are not that even, gouged a trough in the lawn, leaving a kind of flap of skin ... I mean grass. So I pulled back the scalpel ... lawn mower, and lifted the flap-lip. The earth beneath was blood-red and damp. I put my hand in and found the texture to be smooth and yielding. Like flesh. Only strangely more so. Yielding, I mean. So much more so that my hand sank in. To the wrist. I pulled my hand out. It was quite dry. Everything appeared to be as usual. But then, no ...

No. 2: **Alice** I find all this Uhuru business so tiring. And it has nothing to do with elitism or racism. It is simply a question of standards. It is utterly absurd the way backward people dictate to us. You don't hear us clamouring to be allowed to attend Masai circumcision ceremonies, now, do you? Although actually that might not be a bad idea. I do find the Masai a rather attractive lot. Fearfully grubby and all that – they drink blood and wash their hair in cow piss – but they're so well built.

No. 3: **Stix** Yei! I wake up one morning in the ghetto, I say – no, no – aikona, uh-uh! Three hours to work. Three hours home. Three hours to sleep. Aikona! Hayi suka! (*Angrily.*) I was sick and tired of this bladdy nonsense! Ek is die moer-in met die blierie chandies! All over the place, I see signs: vacancies ... vacancies ... vacancies! Furnished apartments! Rooms to let! I say – hey, fixed up – here we go! I put on my tie ... my Florsheim shoes – two-tone – ziya-sparkela! A dash of Brylcreem ... and my extra-special Colgate Smile ...
